This month's article is about *MOLD*. What are molds? Generally, molds are fungi. Scientists do not know how many species of mold there are, but estimates range from tens of thousands to more than three hundred thousand. A lot of mold! Molds are found indoors and outdoors – in the air and on surfaces - and grow best in warm, damp, humid environments. Prime locations for mold include bathrooms, basements, compost piles, cut grass.

Molds, themselves, are not toxic or poisonous. Certain molds, however, are toxigenic, meaning they can produce toxins. It is not necessary to determine the type of mold you may find; all molds should be treated the same with respect to potential health risks and removal.

Everyone should take routine precautions to prevent mold from growing in a home. Keep humidity levels as low as possible – use the fans/vents in bathrooms and kitchens. In their absence, open windows. Consider a dehumidifier. Clean bathrooms with mold-killing products.

If you do find mold growing, act immediately upon its discovery. To remove mold from hard surfaces, use commercial products, soap and water, or a bleach solution of no more than 1 part bleach to 10 parts water. If you opt for the bleach approach, NEVER mix bleach with ammonia or other household cleaners. Doing so will produce toxic fumes. Open windows and doors to ventilate the area. Wear rubber boots, gloves, and goggles while cleaning the affected area. Also, identify the source of moisture and strive to reduce if not eliminate it.

Some people are sensitive to molds and experience congestion, wheezing, and red or itchy eyes or skin. If allergic to mold or have asthma, reactions can be more intense and include fever or shortness of breath.

If your rent is not paid, you are subject to an eviction for nonpayment. We are not in the business to evict, but we are in the business to COLLECT rent. HUD requires the Housing Authority to send in yearend reports. If there are outstanding rents, we follow the requirements outlined in the lease for non-payment. This could include termination. Just because it's December does not mean we will not process a non-payment eviction. If you are a chronic delinquent payer, you could be subject to eviction. To avoid this from happening, PAY YOUR RENT ON TIME.

Hopefully, everyone was able to get rid of their carved pumpkins before the snow fell. Christmas decorations are popping up and look great. If you have a real tree, make sure you water it frequently so that it does not dry out and become a fire hazard.

Children will be out of school for the holiday break. Keep a watchful eye when they are outside playing.



Bed Bug Information Center

Where should you look?

- Mattress (piping, sides, underside)
- Box spring (remove ticking)
- Bed frame
- Linens
- Furniture seams, pleats, piping, joints
- Corners and drawers of desks, dressers, etc.
- Door, window, and baseboard trim
- Items on the floor

What should you look for?

- All life stages: eggs, nymphs, adults
- Skin casts
- Blood spots

How do you avoid them?


Carefully inspect all used furniture, linens, and clothing before bringing them into your home.

- Wash and dry clothes on hottest setting items can stand. Transport clothes in plastic bags. Do not put clean clothes in bags used to transport dirty clothes. Throw those away!
- Vacuum frequently.
- Remove clutter.

If possible, use a high powered flashlight when looking around your unit. If you find a bed bug, notify staff immediately. Staff and you will work together to prepare for any needed treatment. Don't delay. It's much easier to treat one or two than it is twenty or thirty. Again, successful eradication requires resident involvement and cooperation.

The sooner we know, the lower the cost to you.
