In an effort to encourage REDUCE REUSE RECYCLE, reduce being the best of the three, I am sharing some not-so-fun facts about plastic.

The mass production of plastic began sixty years ago. In those sixty years, 18,301,500,000,000 pounds of plastic have been created. Of this, over 75% has become plastic waste. Twelve percent has been incinerated; nine percent has been recycled. The rest has ended up in landfills or the oceans.

- Globally, humans buy 1 million plastic bottles per second.
- Plastic takes more than 400 years to degrade.
- With current trends, by 2050, landfills will contain 26,460,000,000,000 pounds of plastic – 35,000 times the weight of the Empire State Building.
- With current trends, by 2050, ton for ton, the oceans will contain more plastic than fish.
- Plastic in the oceans injures and kills birds, fish, and other marine animals.
- Much of the growth in plastic production is due to increased plastic packaging.
- Half of all manufactured plastic becomes trash in less than one year.

What can you do?

- Use reusable bags for all your shopping.
- Use a reusable water bottle and drink from the tap.
- When available, buy the option not wrapped in plastic.
- Reuse disposable plastic items instead of using once and tossing.
- If disposing of the plastic is necessary, recycle!

Enjoy your winter activities. See you in March.




RESIDENT NEWS AND ISSUES...By Debbie Zerrahn

Bed Bug Information Center

Where should you look?

- Mattress (piping, sides, underside)
- Box spring (remove ticking)
- Bed frame
- Linens
- Furniture seams, pleats, piping, joints
- Corners and drawers of desks, dressers, etc.
- Door, window, and baseboard trim
- Items on the floor

What should you look for?

- All life stages: eggs, nymphs, adults
- Skin casts
- Blood spots

How do you avoid them?

Carefully inspect all used furniture, linens, and clothing before bringing them into your home.

- Wash and dry clothes on hottest setting items can stand. Transport clothes in plastic bags. Do not put clean clothes in bags used to transport dirty clothes. Throw those away!
- Vacuum frequently.
- Remove clutter.

If possible, use a high powered flashlight when looking around your unit. If you find a bed bug, notify staff immediately. Staff and you will work together to prepare for any needed treatment. Don't delay. It's much easier to treat one or two than it is twenty or thirty. Again, successful eradication requires resident involvement and cooperation.

The sooner we know, the lower the cost to you.
