Trying something new.

The maintenance staff are basically in apartments all day long. So much so, that they all look the same after a while. Dealing with the same maintenance issues, day after day, sparks the brain idea machine.

How can we make this thing better for the tenant and also make this thing better for the maintenance personnel?

One such example is the removal of some troublesome doors on selected closets and laundry areas at the Algonquin complex. Many of these doors are constantly off track, mostly due to obstructions and not from tenant abuse.

Laundry areas have been the most problematic in that not all washers and dryers open the same. Dryer doors open out but can't be opened fully because a bi-fold door is in the way. Newer front load washing machines are the same way. While we might enjoy airing other people's dirty laundry, we don't want to necessarily air our own. So what do we do? Well, we remove the doors and place a rod in its place. This allows the tenant to freely access machines and if they so choose to get creative with their choice of a concealing curtain to hide things.



The same holds true with the entry areas at the Algonquin.

These entries are small enough without having to have room for a bi-fold door to swing out. Depending on the size of the door, one needs to have a clear area of 9 to 16 inches in front of the door. What a waste of space! Try storing an odd shaped item behind a bi-fold and guess what? It's off the track and probably ready to fall out. Not the best situation with small children.

So once again, remove the problematic door and put in a sturdy rod.

Choice. Put up a nice curtain to hide belongings, leave it open for more space, or just watch Lilliputians do chin-ups on the bar. Instant entertainment! You don't even have to read the book!

So we are trying this in a few apartments and seeing how it works.

Let's all have a good day and stop hiding behind closed doors when we can let things swing in the breeze.



Bed Bug Information Center

Where should you look?

- Mattress (piping, sides, underside)
- Box spring (remove ticking)
- Bed frame
- Linens
- Furniture seams, pleats, piping, joints
- Corners and drawers of desks, dressers, etc.
- Door, window, and baseboard trim
- Items on the floor

What should you look for?

- All life stages: eggs, nymphs, adults
- Skin casts
- Blood spots

How do you avoid them?

Carefully inspect all used furniture, linens, and clothing before bringing them into your home.

- Wash and dry clothes on hottest setting items can stand. Transport clothes in plastic bags. Do not put clean clothes in bags used to transport dirty clothes. Throw those away!
- Vacuum frequently.
- Remove clutter.

If possible, use a high powered flashlight when looking around your unit. If you find a bed bug, notify staff immediately. Staff and you will work together to prepare for any needed treatment. Don't delay. It's much easier to treat one or two than it is twenty or thirty. Again, successful eradication requires resident involvement and cooperation.

The sooner we know, the lower the cost to you.
