SARAH'S NEWS

Inspections are part of life at the Housing Authority. Pest inspections, smoke alarm inspections, fire extinguisher inspections, annual inspections, housekeeping inspections – the list seems endless. While bothersome, the intent of each and every one of these inspections is the safety and wellbeing of residents.

With the new lease and attachments/policies going into effect September 4, please be mindful of provisions relating to inspections.

Section 16 of the Lease, Access by Authority, states the Housing Authority needs to provide 48 hours written notice to perform routine inspections, preventive maintenance, pest management inspections and treatment, or to show the unit for re-renting. It also states the Housing Authority may enter the dwelling unit at any time without advance notice when there is reasonable cause to believe an emergency exists.

Section 20(b)(17) of the Lease, Termination by Authority, includes "failure to allow inspection of the dwelling unit" as a cause for termination of the lease.

Attachment I, Bed Bug Policy, underscores the importance of participating in, and being prepared for, inspections/treatments. Section 2(b) reads, "If a tenant declines any regularly scheduled inspections and/or preventive treatments, the tenant is responsible for the full cost of any treatment of any subsequent infestation that occurs in the next six calendar months." Section 2(c) reads, "If the condition of a tenant's unit or the status of any animal(s) (loose, not confined to bathroom) is such that any inspection and/or preventive treatment is not possible, the tenant is responsible for the full cost of any treatment of any subsequent infestation that occurs in the next six calendar months." And, Section 2(d) reads, "A regularly scheduled inspection and/or preventive treatment can be declined with good cause. Good cause is defined as an unavoidable conflict which seriously affects the health, safety, or welfare of the household. The Housing Authority may request documentation of good cause."

INTERESTED IN HOUSING ASSISTANCE?

If you are not currently living in the Lake Flower high rise or Algonquin Apartments, and you are not currently participating in the Housing Choice Voucher program, don't be shy!

If you are interested in assistance, you should start the process of determining your eligibility. You can go onto our website to print out an application and either drop it off at the office or in the mail. you can also call us and have us mail you an application or stop by to pick up an application. See contact information on last page.

You must be at least 18 years old, and a United States citizen or a non-citizen who has eligible immigration status. Single persons are eligible, as well as households with or without children. HUD commonly refers to a household as a "family," so don't let that term confuse you. A "family" consists of one or more persons, and having children is not required to be considered a "family."

Just a reminder, if you have a fire pit in your back yard, make sure that it has a cover and only burn wood in the pit. Do not burn your regular trash or plastic as it contains toxic fumes that reach your neighbors' yards. Also, be mindful of the hour and the volume level of your voices when enjoying your backyard. Several families have young children that go to bed early and the loud gatherings can disturb your neighbors. The Algonquin apartments had no tenants move-in, and no tenants move-out during the month of July.

REMINDERS:

- Please make sure your rent is paid. If you are having difficulties, please call the office and set up a repayment agreement.
- ◆ Lake Flower Apartments and the Algonquin Apartments are nonsmoking facilities. Smoking of any kind is not allowed in apartments, in yards, or anywhere on the property. This is a violation of the terms of the lease agreement.

Bed Bug Information

Where should you look?

- Mattress (piping, sides, underside)
- Box spring (remove ticking)
- •Bed frame
- Linens
- ●Furniture seams, pleats, piping, joints
- Corners and drawers of desks, dressers, etc.
- •Door, window, and baseboard trim
- •Items on the floor

What should you look for?

- •All life stages: eggs, nymphs, adults
- Skin casts
- Blood spots

How do you avoid them?

Carefully inspect all used furniture, linens, and clothing before bringing them into your home.

- Wash and dry clothes on hottest setting items can stand. Transport clothes in plastic bags. Do not put clean clothes in bags used to transport dirty clothes. Throw those away!
 - Vacuum frequently.
 - Remove clutter.

If possible, use a high powered flashlight when looking around your unit. If you find a bed bug, notify staff immediately. Staff and you will work together to prepare for any needed treatment. Don't delay. It's much easier to treat one or two than it is twenty or thirty. Again, successful eradication requires resident involvement and cooperation.

The sooner we know, the lower the cost to you.
