Those who have been to the Lake Flower Apartments in the last week have seen the new outdoor lift. Hooray! Upon its installation, we realized it did not have automatic door openers. We have ordered them and hope they will be installed in the next few weeks. There has also been some forward motion regarding awnings for the Lake Flower Apartments' entrances. We received a quote (more than we thought but manageable) and have paid the deposit. A winter installation is anticipated.

Up at the Algonquin Apartments, we just replaced a section of sewer line. We did not anticipate doing this; but, it was necessary. We were fortunate in that the contractor could mobilize quickly and complete the project in a matter of days. Bids for new rear yard fences/gates at Algonquin are due November 4. The price of lumber and other supplies/materials along with labor shortages make this effort challenging. Depending on the bids received, we may need to go back out to bid late winter.

Ah Yes! Another heating season has arrived. Time to batten down the hatches. Get out the warm clothes. And snuggle up with your animals. Yes I did use the word snuggle.

If you follow the news at all, other than what is up with the Real Housewives of Beverly Hills, like I do, you may have heard that the cost of all forms of energy that we heat our homes with is going way up. Let's do our part to save some money.

Both of the housing authority properties heat primarily with electric baseboard heaters. Delivery of electricity isn't like propane/natural gas or fuel oil where a driver needs to show up at your house and dispense product. It's just there like magic. Unless, of course, weather takes down power lines or the grid is hacked by some 12 year old practicing their cybersecurity skills for a future lucrative position with the US government or probably Facebook. Any way here are a few tips, on how to maximize the heat produced via electric baseboard heat and keep that 12 year-old's computer running.

- Move furniture away from, and lift up, any window treatments well above the heater itself to promote air flow. Something called convection from science class is at work here.
- Close doors to individual rooms that are not in use. Set the thermostat in those rooms to 55 degrees such that they can be warmed up relatively quickly when needed. If it's a room that is rarely used turn the temp down to 45 degrees and save some money.



DON'T FORGET YOUR KEY!

When leaving your apartment, remember to grab your keys. You were issued two keys – one for your use and one for you to give to a friend or family member as a backup in the event you get locked out. Although there is an answering service, you can call to have a staff member unlock your door, staff may not be able to respond for a couple hours. You should always contact



your friend or family member first before contacting the answering service.

There is a \$35 lock out charge if a staff member has to let you in.

INTERESTED IN HOUSING ASSISTANCE?

If you are not currently living in the Lake Flower high rise or Algonquin Apartments, and you are not currently participating in the Housing Choice Voucher program, don't be shy!

If you are interested in assistance, you should start the process of determining your eligibility. You can go onto our website to print out an application and either drop it off at the office or in the mail. you can also call us and have us mail you an application or stop by to pick up an application. See contact information on last page.

You must be at least 18 years old, and a United States citizen or a non-citizen who has eligible immigration status. Single persons are eligible, as well as households with or without children. HUD commonly refers to a household as a "family," so don't let that term confuse you. A "family" consists of one or more persons, and having children is not required to be considered a "family."

Bed Bug Information

Where should you look?

- Mattress (piping, sides, underside)
- Box spring (remove ticking)
- Bed frame
- Linens
- ●Furniture seams, pleats, piping, joints
- Corners and drawers of desks, dressers, etc.
- •Door, window, and baseboard trim
- •Items on the floor

What should you look for?

- •All life stages: eggs, nymphs, adults
- Skin casts
- Blood spots

How do you avoid them?

Carefully inspect all used furniture, linens, and clothing before bringing them into your home.

- Wash and dry clothes on hottest setting items can stand. Transport clothes in plastic bags. Do not put clean clothes in bags used to transport dirty clothes. Throw those away!
 - Vacuum frequently.
 - Remove clutter.

If possible, use a high powered flashlight when looking around your unit. If you find a bed bug, notify staff immediately. Staff and you will work together to prepare for any needed treatment. Don't delay. It's much easier to treat one or two than it is twenty or thirty. Again, successful eradication requires resident involvement and cooperation.

The sooner we know, the lower the cost to you.
