Video footage is the most accurate way to verify information provided. Knowing the exact date/time an incident occurred allows staff to review the footage in an efficient and timely fashion. Staff are not watching video feeds at all times. Decisions cannot be made based on a he said/she said situation. Help us help you in resolving issues by getting us the information we need to address issues efficiently and appropriately.

INTERESTED IN HOUSING ASSISTANCE?

If you are not currently living in the Lake Flower high rise or Algonquin Apartments, and you are not currently participating in the Housing Choice Voucher program, don't be shy!

If you are interested in assistance, you should start the process of determining your eligibility. You can go onto our website to print out an application and either drop it off at the office or in the mail. you can also call us and have us mail you an application or stop by to pick up an application. See contact information on last page.

You must be at least 18 years old, and a United States citizen or a non-citizen who has eligible immigration status. Single persons are eligible, as well as households with or without children. HUD commonly refers to a household as a "family," so don't let that term confuse you. A "family" consists of one or more persons, and having children is not required to be considered

Ingredients

TOMATO AVOCADO SALAD BY BAREFOOT CONTESSA

> ½ cup plus 2 tablespoons freshly squeezed lemon juice, 2 firm, ripe Hass avocados
> 2 pints cherry or grape tomatoes, halved through the stem
> ½ cup medium-diced red onion
> Good olive oil
> Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper
> 3 ounces baby arugula

Pour ¼ cup of the lemon juice into a mixing bowl. Cut the avocados in half, remove the pit, peel them (o scoop them out with a spoon), and cut in ½-inch dice. Immediately add the avocados to the lemon juice and toss carefully. Add the cherry tomatoes and red onion and toss again. In a small glass measuring cup, whisk together the remaining 2 tablespoons of lemon juice, ¼ cup olive oil, ½ teaspoon salt, and ½ teaspoon pepper. Pour enough of the vinaigrette over the tomato and avocado mixture to moisten completely. Add the arugula, add more vinaigrette, sprinkle with 1½ teaspoons salt and ½ teaspoon

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pepper, and toss well. Taste for seasonings (you want the salad well seasoned!) and serve at room

Hopefully, everyone has been having a wonderful summer. Hard to believe it is over and fall is in the air. On my daily commute, I have noticed the leaves starting to change already. Ugh!!! School starts on September 6th. Who is happier to go back to school? The children, or the parents watching their little ones get on the bus? Why do our summers have to go by so fast? We get some warm weather and poof it is gone! The following are observances in the month of September: National Wildlife Day: the 4th, Labor Day: the 5th, Full Moon: the 10th, Patriot Day & National Grandparent's Day: the 11th, Constitution Day: the 17th, First Day of Autumn, the 22nd, Rosh Hashanah: the 25th – 27th, and National Coffee Day: the 29th. Lake Flower News: We are still *patiently* awaiting the arrival and installation of the new awnings. The latest report is by October 31, 2022. We will have to wait and see. Maintenance is working quite diligently on making units available for occupancy. Lately, the apartments have been left in need of a lot of repairs, making it twice as long to turn over. In addition, tenants have been leaving their unwanted furniture in the hallways. If there is something you need to dispose of, please contact the maintenance department for the proper removal. Do not assume that someone else will want it. This creates a safety hazard in the hallways and is unsightly. The Lake Flower High-rise had two move-ins and no one move-out during the month of August.

<u>Algonquin News</u>: The new backyard gate/fencing project continues. Tenants, please remember not to park in the fire lanes. With the start of school, there is going to be a lot more traffic; bus drivers need to drive through the lot. In addition, do not leave children unsupervised. This is in the lease and when children are left unsupervised, things can happen. We anticipate two transfers in the month of September. Once again, the vacated apartments have been left in need of a lot of repairs. It is taking twice as long to turn over units. The Al-

gonquin Apartments had no one move-in and no one move-out during the month of August. Apartments continue to be made ready for new occupancy.

Watch out and pay attention to the school buses! Never pass a stopped school bus with flashing red lights!!! Remember, a kind word goes a long way!



Bed Bug Information

Where should you look?

- •Mattress (piping, sides, underside)
- •Box spring (remove ticking)
- •Bed frame
- Linens
- •Furniture seams, pleats, piping, joints
- •Corners and drawers of desks, dressers, etc.
- •Door, window, and baseboard trim
- •Items on the floor

What should you look for?

- •All life stages: eggs, nymphs, adults
- •Skin casts
- •Blood spots

How do you avoid them?

Carefully inspect all used furniture, linens, and clothing before bringing them into your home.

- •Wash and dry clothes on hottest setting items can stand. Transport clothes in plastic bags. Do not put clean clothes in bags used to transport dirty clothes. Throw those away!
 - •Vacuum frequently.
 - •Remove clutter.

If possible, use a high powered flashlight when looking around your unit. If you find a bed bug, notify staff immediately. Staff and you will work together to prepare for any needed treatment. Don't delay. It's much easier to treat one or two than it is twenty or thirty. Again, successful eradication requires resident involvement and cooperation.

The sooner we know, the lower the cost to you.
