SARAH'S NEWS

We are getting new awnings at the Lake Flower Apartments – not a moment too soon! After an unfortunate experience with the previous contractor, we have signed an agreement with a new contractor. Awnings will be replaced this fall. The color? Burgundy.

At Algonquin, the problem(s) with the storm sewer will be assessed and repaired in coming weeks.

For both projects, we will strive to keep everyone updated. There will be some short-term inconvenience to permit the work and protect residents and visitors.

Onto another topic:

In various media outlets, words we'd rather not see or say are returning: COVID, RSV, and flu. As fall/winter near, the volume will become louder. With similar symptoms for all three, it is important to exercise care.

- ⇒ COVID. While numbers are low, data for Franklin County as of August 12 show an increasing number of cases and hospitalizations. In the week prior to August 12, eight people were hospitalized with COVID. Vaccines/boosters for the latest strain(s) will be available this fall.
- ⇒ **RSV** Respiratory Syncytial Virus. This is a common virus that usually causes mild coldlike symptoms. While most people recover in one to two weeks, for some it can be severe. Infants and seniors are more likely to develop serious cases. The RSV vaccine protects adults 60 years and older from RSV disease.
- \Rightarrow Flu. You know the symptoms feeling feverish, muscle or body aches, fatigue, cough, sore throat, runny/stuffy nose.... Flu shots are available.

All of these infections are contagious. Returning to the oft-stated advice that began in 2020, keep your distance from others; cover coughs and sneezes with a tissue or arm - or, better yet, wear a mask; wash hands well and often, and clean frequently touched surfaces regularly.

GOOD NEIGHBOR AWARD POLICY

Purpose: To encourage residents to recognize "good deeds" done by others.

Qualities of a "GOOD NEIGHBOR": A Good Neighbor is a resident of Harrietstown Housing Authority, who has performed an act of kindness for another resident or residents. (Such as cleaning up spills in common areas, helping a neighbor with daily functions, or making a new resident feel welcome, etc.)

There is not a limit on the number of times a resident can be nominated.

A resident or staff will complete a good neighbor nomination form. (Kept in Irene's office). Along with an award certificate, the person will receive a HHA Good Neighbor star for their door and their name will be listed in the monthly newsletter.

INTERESTED IN HOUSING ASSISTANCE?

If you are not currently living in the Lake Flower high rise or Algonquin Apartments, and you are not currently participating in the Housing Choice Voucher program, don't be shy!

If you are interested in assistance, you should start the process of determining your eligibility. You can go onto our website to print out an application and either drop it off at the office or in the mail. you can also call us and have us mail you an application or stop by to pick up an application. See contact information on last page.

You must be at least 18 years old, and a United States citizen or a non-citizen who has eligible immigration status. Single persons are eligible, as well as households with or without children. HUD commonly refers to a household as a "family," so don't let that term confuse you. A "family" consists of one or more persons, and having children is not required to be considered

Summer is almost over!! Short and wet!! School is starting up soon and I bet the kids cannot wait to go back. The schools have been doing a lot of work outside over the summer. Nice improvements! It seems like the leaves are changing color earlier this year too. I am hoping for beautiful fall foliage to make up for the cold and wet summer.

All tenants: remember the new lease provisions went into effect September 4, 2023.

The office will be closing at noon on Friday, September 15th for Staff Development Day.

The following are observances and events for the month of September: Labor Day & National Wildlife Day 4th, National Grandparents Day 10th, Patriot Day 11th, Rosh Hashanah 15th – 17th, Constitution Day 17th, First Day of Autumn 23rd, Yom Kippur 24th & 25th, Full Moon (Harvest) 29th, and National Coffee Day 29th.

Lake Flower News: Yes, it is happening! Work has begun on the awnings. As you can see, some of them have been removed. Hopefully, the new ones will be in place by the end of this month. Lake Flower had two tenants move-in, and one tenant move out during the month of August.

Algonquin News: School will be back in session soon and that means school buses coming to and from the apartments. Please be cautious and drive slowly through the parking lots. Children can get very excited and not pay attention to their surroundings. Also, remember, do not park in the Fire Lanes. The school buses have a hard enough time getting through the parking lots; when a car is parked in front of an apartment, it makes it almost impossible to get through. The Algonquin apartments had no tenants move-in, and no tenants move-out during the month of August.

Reminder: Lake Flower Apartments and the Algonquin Apartments are non-smoking facilities. Smoking of any kind is not allowed in apartments, in yards, or anywhere on the property. This is a violation of the terms of the lease agreement.

Reminder: Please make sure your rent is paid. If you are having difficulties, please call the office and set up a repayment agreement if necessary. **Bed Bug Information**

Where should you look?

- •Mattress (piping, sides, underside)
- •Box spring (remove ticking)
- Bed frame
- Linens
- •Furniture seams, pleats, piping, joints
- •Corners and drawers of desks, dressers, etc.
- •Door, window, and baseboard trim
- •Items on the floor
- What should you look for?
- •All life stages: eggs, nymphs, adults
- •Skin casts
- •Blood spots

How do you avoid them?

Carefully inspect all used furniture, linens, and clothing before bringing them into your home.

- •Wash and dry clothes on hottest setting items can stand. Transport clothes in plastic bags. Do not put clean clothes in bags used to transport dirty clothes. Throw those away!
 - •Vacuum frequently.
 - •Remove clutter.

If possible, use a high powered flashlight when looking around your unit. If you find a bed bug, notify staff immediately. Staff and you will work together to prepare for any needed treatment. Don't delay. It's much easier to treat one or two than it is twenty or thirty. Again, successful eradication requires resident involvement and cooperation.

The sooner we know, the lower the cost to you.
